Napoleon, N. D., Oct. 2. By the

SECURED OPTION.

Dickinson, N. D., Sept. 2. The
Northern Pacific agents have finally
secured two options from Engineer
Archie Dingman for the big railroad
reservoir a miles west of the city.
One is a water right covering about
eight acres of land for a considera-
tion of \$3,000, the other is for the
purchase of forty-six acres at \$5,000.
The company has until the first of
January to decide which option they
will take. In the meantime a large
crew of workmen are cutting out an
island and getting things in shape
for the reservoir which is to store
the water which will be used at the
round house in the future.

Beach, N. D., Oct. 2. The Beach
fair was a revelation to a good many

curred to all projectors. When the
day arrived the fair managers had
purchased 160 acres of land for fair

made a fine half-mile race track,
built a good grand stand, 36 stalls
for stock, 16 box stalls for race horses
and had everything completed that
was necessary for the opening of the
fair.

can be grown. The domestic depart-
ments were not neglected and the
enterprising women of Beach and vic-
