Literary Notes

HARRY WHITNEY'S EXPERIENCES AS AN ARCTIC SPORTSMAN.

The fortunes of polar-exploration have thrust Harry Whitney, the New Haven sportsman, prominently into the foreground of one of the most interesting controversies of history. The mere fact that he was the first white man who met the emancipated Cook when the latter was returning from his polar search makes his testimony most important toward settling the claims of the Brooklyn physician. Moreover, his "slipping" southward with Peary, after he was compelled to leave behind Dr. Cook's instruments, serves only to accentuate his importance in the eyes of the world, divided as it is into rival Peary and Cook camps.

But it should not be forgotten that Mr. Whitney has, apart from his relations with Peary and Cook, won some very honorable laurels as a sportsman pioneer. Until Mr. Whitney set out for the arctic on his hunt, no sportsman had ever penetrated into that waste and desolate region. As a sportsman pure and simple Mr. Whitney spent two years above the Arctic Circle, having planned his campaign for securing the best of the arctic game as carefully as Cook or Peary planned theirs.

When Mr. Peary landed at Truro, Nova Scotia, Thursday he told a representative of the Outing Magazine something of the long and lonely months he had spent. He recounted several thrilling experiences of hunting over the ice after the fiercest of bears, after seals, musk oxen and other game. Indeed Mr. Whitney's hunt sets a new record for sportsmanship. That it should have happened to Peary, that the weary Cook approaching his camp from the north serves to sharpen with a decided dramatic value the popular interest in a one-man expedition after big game that stands without a parallel.

He has contracted to write the full account of his hunting expedition and of his relations with Cook and Peary for the Outing Magazine. The first installment will appear in the December number of Outing.

The October Review of Reviews comes out with a group of striking articles on the discovery of the North Pole. Besides the character sketch of Commander Peary, which while unsigned is understood to have been written by one who has long enjoyed a close acquaintance with the explorer and an intimate knowledge of his work, there is a popular scientific article on the discovery and its significance by Cyrus C. Adams, the geographer, and these are followed by an extended interview with Dr. Cook reported by W. T. Stead from Copenhagen. These three articles were written exclusively for the Review of Reviews during the month of September after the news had been thrilled by the news flashed from the distant coast of Labrador. The securing and publication of these articles within so short a time is a feat unparalleled in monthly magazine journalism.

Wheat Gossip.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—Wheat—Liverpool opened earlier on prospects heavy world's shipments but rallied, closing 1/4 to 3/8 higher on firmness in continental markets and higher prices asked for Manitoba. Berlin was 1 1/2c higher on better export demand, and Buda Pesth 1 1/2c on short covering of October wheat in that market. Our market opened fractionally lower and has moved within a narrow range all day, there being no pronounced disposition to press the short side, and so many of the local professionals leaning toward the bull side, trade at times becomes very small and the market swings merely with the orders. Winnipeg reports some falling off in their cash demand, with an easing of prices relative to the October.

Rain is predicted for the winter wheat states east of the Mississippi over Sunday which will prove beneficial to wheat crops.

Chicago Gossip.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—Cables on wheat 1/2 to 3/8 higher and on corn unchanged to 1/8 lower. The government report on wheat in our opinion can not be construed in any other way than bearish. We believe the government forecasts in the northwest has been under estimated and that the spring wheat crop is larger even than the government intimates, but owing to the strong cash demand and the evident desire of millers to lay in stocks we do not look for any material break.
