RECIPROCIITY AND FLAX.

An argument recently advanced by a reciprocity advocate that taking the tariff off of flax would enable North Dakota farmers to get seed flax from Canada cheaper than they could buy it on this side of the line, says the Grand Forks Times.

We have a market, one-third of which is supplied by a North Dakota produce which under this agreement it is proposed to share equally with Canada.

There is now a tariff of twenty-five cents per bushel on flax seed. During the year ending June 30, 1910, there was imported into this country from Canada, 1,410,398 bushels of flax.

Now accepting the theory of the advocates of reciprocity that the agreement will lower the cost of a food product the amount of the tariff, it is evident that it will have the same effect on other articles.

PLACING THE AUTOMOBILE IN COMMISSION

Prior to a Season's Service the Automobile Should be Put in a Good State of Repair, Replacing the Worn-out Parts, and Adjusting the Relations.

Approaching the touring season should be a reminder to the automobilist that the pleasure to be derived from the use of a car will depend entirely upon the care with which it is overhauled prior to placing it in service, and that the cost of the service during the touring time will be the absolute minimum if a reasonable amount of money is expended in overhauling work in the first place.

garage, clean the place out thoroughly and then replace the supplies, tools and other necessary things, putting each article in its place, and by a system of tags mark everything so that time will not be wasted in vain searches for the necessary tools and supplies such as will further the work of overhauling the automobile. Having thus arranged for the taking apart of the automobile, if it may be assumed that the tools and supplies are sufficiently complete to warrant proceeding with the work, the car should be rolled in and so placed on the floor that it may be gotten at from every point of vantage, and with a pair of horses that may be improvised for the purpose if they are not available, the chassis should be lifted high enough off the floor and rested upon the horses to make the further effort an agreeable undertaking.
