## NEW BUILDINGS FOR MANDAN SECOND JOHN HEITZ RECEIVED \$50 FINE

A LARGE AMOUNT OF IMPROVEMENTS ARE BEING MADE AT THE MORTON COUNTY CAPITAL STEADY BOOM IN PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS THIS SEASON.

This spring there has been a steady boom in building and property improvements in the city of Mandan and the majority of the citizens are increasing the value of their property in one way or another. There are over 5,000 feet of cement sidewalks and cement curbing being put down in which will be a valuable thing when the city will be boulevarded.

There are also a number of new residences being erected at the present time and if crop conditions prove favorable there will be still greater building operations.

There is not very much building being done at the present time in the business district, with the exception of the addition to the First National bank block. This addition when it is completed, will be two stories and basement. The building will be faced with Hebron brick. There will be two storerooms facing Collins avenue and the second floor will be converted into office suites.

The Mandan Abstract Company has leased one of the down stairs store rooms. The addition when completed will cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000.

The excavation was started about four weeks ago and workmen have just commenced to lay the brick. It is expected that the work will be rushed on the new structure as rapidly as possible and that the building will be ready for occupancy by fall.

# FOREMAN MET ACCIDENTAL DEATH IN SAW MILL

GRAND FORKS JUNE 15. Yesterday morning at 6:40 o'clock, R. A. Boll, foreman of the sawmill of the Wild Rice Lumber company of Ada, met a tragic death, being crushed and mangled in such a frightful manner that he died four hours later without regaining consciousness.

The sawmill is running two shifts and Foreman Boll was going over the mill making preparations for the beginning of the day shift at 7 o'clock. He was standing on the log roller and there was some log left on the platform. In some manner the log slipped or was accidentally tripped, and the log was hurled on him, crushing his chest, and was again hurled back on him by the carrier.

Employees rushed to his assistance, and he was given prompt medical attention, but his injuries were fatal, and nothing could be done for him. The terrible tragedy was a shock to all Ada, where he had been foreman of the sawmill for 15 years and was one of the leading men of the town, taking an active part in all movements.

Deceased was 50 years of age, and leaves a widow but no children. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed. The mill will be closed on the day of the funeral and business will be generally suspended throughout the city as an unusual mark of respect to the memory of one held in exceptionally high esteem by the people of Ada and the entire countryside adjacent thereto.

## SPANKING HIS NEPHEW COST A FINE

(Special to the Tribune) McCLUSKY, N. D., June 14th. A case of assault and battery against Frank Flowers, of Denhoff, was tried before Justice Schroeder this evening. The complaining witness was the thirteen year old George Fuchs, who charged Flowers, who is his uncle, with the offense of assault and battery, the alleged offense having taken place in the barn at the Fuchs place, near Denhoff, last Saturday afternoon. A cow, which Flowers claims belongs to his wife, who was formerly Miss Fuchs, seemed to be the bone of contention. Mrs. Flowers claims that the cow was a present to her from her father, and was given to her when the bossy was not yet a bossy, but just a tiny little calf, while Mrs. Fuchs stoutly maintains that the cow in question was willed to her by her husband.

Several witnesses were heard, and the defendant admitted that he had spanked the boy with a lath, because he was throwing stones at his wife and the "dairy," but denied having assaulted him.

The court found Flowers guilty, and handed him an alternative of \$25 or 12 days. He took an appeal to the district court, through his attorney, Peter A. Winter, and is at liberty on a \$100 bond.
