MACKS GET SERIES MONEY AND LEAVE

Losers in World's Series Collect their Share of the Cash and Break Up.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 17. The Athletic players, 24 in number, have received their world's series checks, calling for \$2,031.68 each, and the championship team of the American league has disbanded for the season. The Athletics, as in other years, presented Trainer Chadwick, the rubber,

clubhouse boys, and Louie Van Zelt, the mascot, with suitable purses in appreciation of their work during the season. Just as soon as the Athletics got their money they began to separate for their respective homes or the places where they will spend the winter. Joe Bush and his bride, Jimmy McAvoy, Eddie Murphy and Jimmy Walsh left with Ira Thomas for Chicago this afternoon to join the all-American league team, which plays the all-star National league team, opening in Milwaukee Sunday.

Hoosier University Eliminated From Championship Race by Badger's Fierce Fight.

Madison, Oct. 17.—Purdue was eliminated today from the race for the conference football title, when Juneau's Wisconsin bunch triumphed over them 14 to 7. The game was terrifically hard and fast and was filled with sensations.

MICHIGAN TRIUMPHS OVER MICH. AGGIES

Goal From Field Brings Wolverines Victory Over Old Rivals; Game Was Spectacular.

Lansing, Mich., Oct. 17. Before the largest crowd that ever saw a football game in this city, Coach Yost's Wolverine machine triumphed over the Michigan Aggies today in a sensational game, in which two evenly matched teams fought for supremacy. Larry Splawn's goal from the field was the only score of the game, and the whistle blew with the 3 to 9 score sending several thousand Michigan rooters home crazy.

Last year the Aggies won, 12 to 7. They were considered 20 per cent stronger this year than last and this victory of Michigan gives a good estimate of Yost's strength on the eve of the great battle between Michigan and Harvard.

BOSTON FINISH HELPED LEAGUE

Wonderful Race by the Braves Stimulated Interest and Brought in the Cash.

A whole box of pepper was injected into the National league's pennant race in mid-season by the sensational work of Boston's new champions in coming from last place after the battle was more than half over and winning the flag by an easy margin at the finish.

This remarkable performance proved a saver for the league financially, as it acted like a pulmotor on the baseball public and revived interest which was fast succumbing to an overdose of John McGraw and Connie Mack.

The owners of the Boston Braves found it absolutely impossible to accommodate all the patrons who flocked to see their phenoms in the old south end grounds, which for more than two decades had been ample to hold all the National league patrons in Beantown. They first accepted the hospitality of the Boston American league club at Fenway park on Saturdays, then, as the Braves increased their speed, used the Red Sox grounds for all home games.

Braves Help Other Clubs. The other club owners of the National league profited by the enthusiasm aroused in Boston, because it spread to other cities and made a real pennant race out of what was thought to be a walkaway for New York's three-time champions. In consequence one or two clubs in the old league which were averted to be close to financial shoals weathered the bad going in fairly good condition.

NOTRE DAME WALLOPED HARK BY THE BULLDOG

On Muddy Field the Easterners Easily Outclass Catholics; Score 28 to 0.

New Haven, Oct. 17. Handicapped by a muddy field which made open work and forward pass attacks very difficult, Notre Dame went down in defeat today here before Yale's football machine in a game witnessed by 10,000 people.

The final score was 28 to 0. Ray Eichenlaub and the rest of Notre Dame's much heralded backfield, found it impossible to pierce Yale's line, while the big blue-sweated men rushed to a touchdown in the first period. They took the battle

straight to the westerners and so tired them out that the three touchdowns in the last half came easily.
