

24 ALAMEDANS PASS TEST FOR POLICE FORCE

50 Fail to Qualify Above 60 Per Cent in 'Intelligence and Education' Quiz

ALAMEDA, April 13.—Twenty-four men out of 74 who took the recent examinations for appointment as police officers received grades above 60 per cent, thereby qualifying to take the final tests. It was announced today by City Manager Neil E. Pierson.

The examinations were conducted by Pierson and Chief of Police Vern Smith while the papers were marked by a committee of judges consisting of Justice of the Peace Edwin M. Otis, Dr. J. A. Ellis and T. A. Powell.

The final examinations, to be announced shortly, will include physical examination of applicants and specialized tests to determine their fitness for police duty, according to Pierson. The preliminary examinations were limited to intelligence and educational tests, he said.

Those men who receive the highest ratings at the conclusion of the final examinations will be put on an "eligible list" from which appointments to the police department will be made, according to Pierson.

State Farm Leader To Aid in Chicago

CHICAGO, April 13.—(AP)—R. W. Blackburn of Thermal, Calif., president of the California Farm Bureau federation, has been appointed a member of a national committee to present the needs of agriculture to the 10th national political convention to be held here in June.

Edward A. O'Neal, federation president, said the appointment of a committee of eight is organized agriculture's first definite step toward complete recognition of farmers in the Republican and Democratic platforms.

"After drawing appropriate platform proposals," he said, "the committee will submit them to both parties at their national conventions."

Fishing Trip Becomes Just Shark Killing

22 of 'em and 11 Sting Rays Are Only Catch of San Leandro Fisherman

SAN LEANDRO, April 13.—It started, says fisherman Fred Hirschmann, to be just another fishing trip to San Lorenzo bay, but it ended in a massacre for 22 sharks and 14 sting rays.

"The first one wasn't so bad," moaned Hirschmann in retrospect, "nor yet the second one. I pulled them out and try Elliott killed them. The first one was a little one, only three feet long. The next one was the biggest of all, more than four and a half feet."

After the seventh or eighth shark, Hirschmann began to wince to his task, he says. "Next came a ray, just to kill the monotony, then another shark. About that time I decided a sandwich would taste pretty good. Before I could take a bite, though, another shark bit, and I lost the sandwich landing him in."

A try for a drink of milk ended when another shark was pulled in and the milk glass sank into the bay, Hirschmann said.

"When we had 22 sharks and all the rays in the boat, I decided we might as well go home again. My next fishing trip is going to be to the nearest wash tub, where I can dangle a hook and line without interference long enough to eat a sandwich and drink my milk, anyway," he predicted.

Bob Shannon, local sportsman's club president, vouches for the probability of the story. "We gave the sharks and rays to a chicken rancher for food," he said.
