Members of the editorial staff of the Anchor, student newspaper of Golden Gate junior high, have been announced.

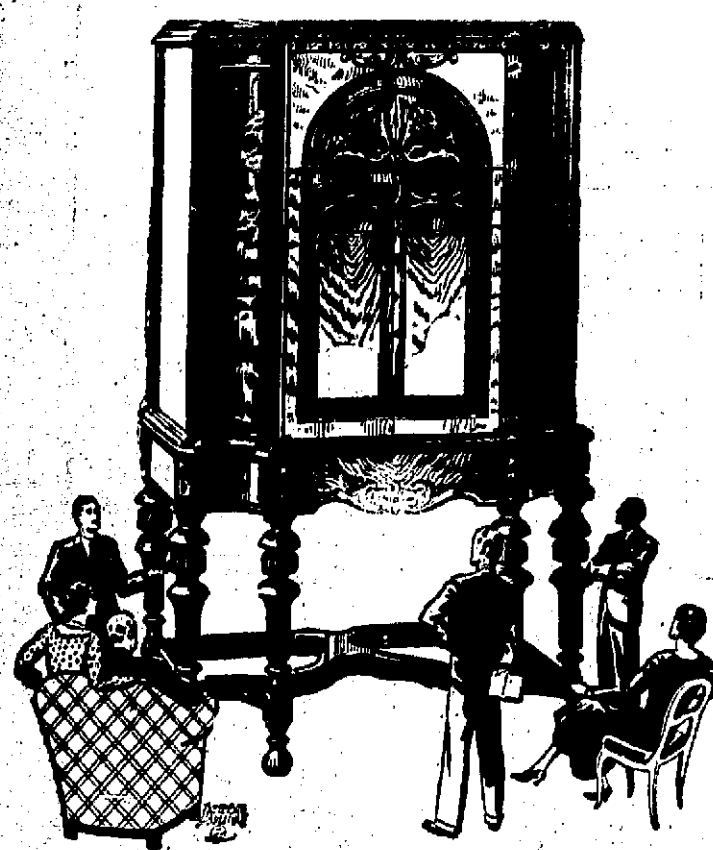
Edward Arnold has been selected editor-in-chief, according to Miss Grace Wells, faculty sponsor.

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### Hospital Homes for Veterans Sought

**SAN FERNANDO, Sept. 13.**—Plans are underway today by the Veteran's Home Seekers Bureau of California to purchase a tract of land in the San Fernando valley within a mile of the Veteran's hospital to provide homes for veterans who desire to receive treatment for tubercular or bronchial ailments.

This was announced today by Dr. W. C. Shipley, medical director of the bureau, who explained that the organization is a non-profit one, designed to find homes, particularly for those veterans who are physically ailing.

"A great many veterans will not go to hospital and leave their families," he explained. "Our bureau is endeavoring to help them receive medical treatment in their home by locating the home within the prescribed limit of a United States hospital."

**SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13.**—Search for the young mother who abandoned her two-month-old baby at the shelter of the Babies' Aid Society last Thursday, turned today to the Van Ness avenue district, where police hope to pick up clues leading to her identification.
