Plans for Modern Structure At Tenth and Franklin Being Completed

Details for construction of an un-to-the-minute market, costing \$100,000, at Touth and Planklin Streets, were being completed today by Fred H. Morgan.

Morgan, who has had 20 years experience in the market and fixture business, is planning a market structure in the Mission style of architecture, containing 30 concessions, and equipped with the latest devices for serving shoppers The interior will be plastered

and three rous of skylights with vide ample inat. There will be two entrances from Franklin Street, and entrances from the parking lots on either side of the building, with a driveway into the basement from Tenth Street to provide storage. In this basement will be a community storage box 12 by 40 feet, to cure for perishable foods for all of the concessionaries. Each concession will have a chute running from the top floor to the basement which will be used to carry waste to the lower floor.

Parking space will be provided by two lots, one on each side of the building and also in the rear, if necessary.
Associated with Morgan in the

venture are Foster Weeks of Week's Securities Corporation, Oakland, and Victor Challen of San Jose, owners of the California Market in that city. They plan to start construction of the new structure in the near future.

One of the modern features of the new market will be the limitation of concession stalls to a height of five feet, allowing the customers to see all over the matket. The market will have maple




