ANY runners change their event in the transition from high school VI to college competition. They change it because they don't possess quite the natural requisites to make them a first-classe "big-time" performer although they were able to win in prep school competition. Bud Deacon, Stanford's pole vaulter, used to be a fair high jumper and

javelin thrower as a prep school star, but because he lacked the natural ability to make him a college star in these events he specialized in the pole rault. He learned the fundamentals of pole vaulting while in high school but he started specializing in this event as a sophomore at college. It was a case of specialization in order to get the best results.

Harlow Rothert, one of Dink Templeton's first shot putters to break 51 feet, was a great javelin prospect as a freshman despite the fact that he didn't make a high school letter in track athletics. But he forsook the spear-tossing event because he decided that he had more ability in the shot put and the two events—javelin and shot—didn't mix very well. Lots of today's champions or near champions have been good athletes in several events but by specializing in one event their rise to the top was faster. Bob Clark, University of California broad jump, is a good all-

round performer, taking the hurdles, shot put and javelin as side events. However, this season he has specialized in the broad jump event and has become one of the nation's best. if he had matriculated in a small college the chances are that he would be a point winner in several other events. One of the most sensational rises to glory in the history of Pacific Coast athletics has been that of Gus Maier, Stanford's captain who just about ended his college career when he smashed into a low hurdle last Saturday, cracking two bones in his forearm. His is a story of specialization and hard work, a tale of fighting against the odds to become a real cinder
