In this first session of leather slinging since losing his title to Jim Braddock in June, Max fought from his new crouch during most of three rounds. Crouching forward with chin well protected by his left shoulder, and with right glove held high to block punches from his starboard side, Max covered better than heretofore-and at the same time was in position to use his own left hook damagingly.

The former champ and his handlers realized that if Max, with his previous open style of fighting, was unable to evade the blows of ageing Braddock, he would have little chance against Louis—a smart, deadly twohanded orusher. Max staggered Tony once in the second round with a left hook to the chin. The ex-champion appeared somewhat uckered when the going got rough, but that was to be expected his first day of boxing. Maxie weighs 218 pounds. During the month of training he expects to pare off about 10 pounds.
