

# Frank Coakley Paid Tribute By Prosecutors

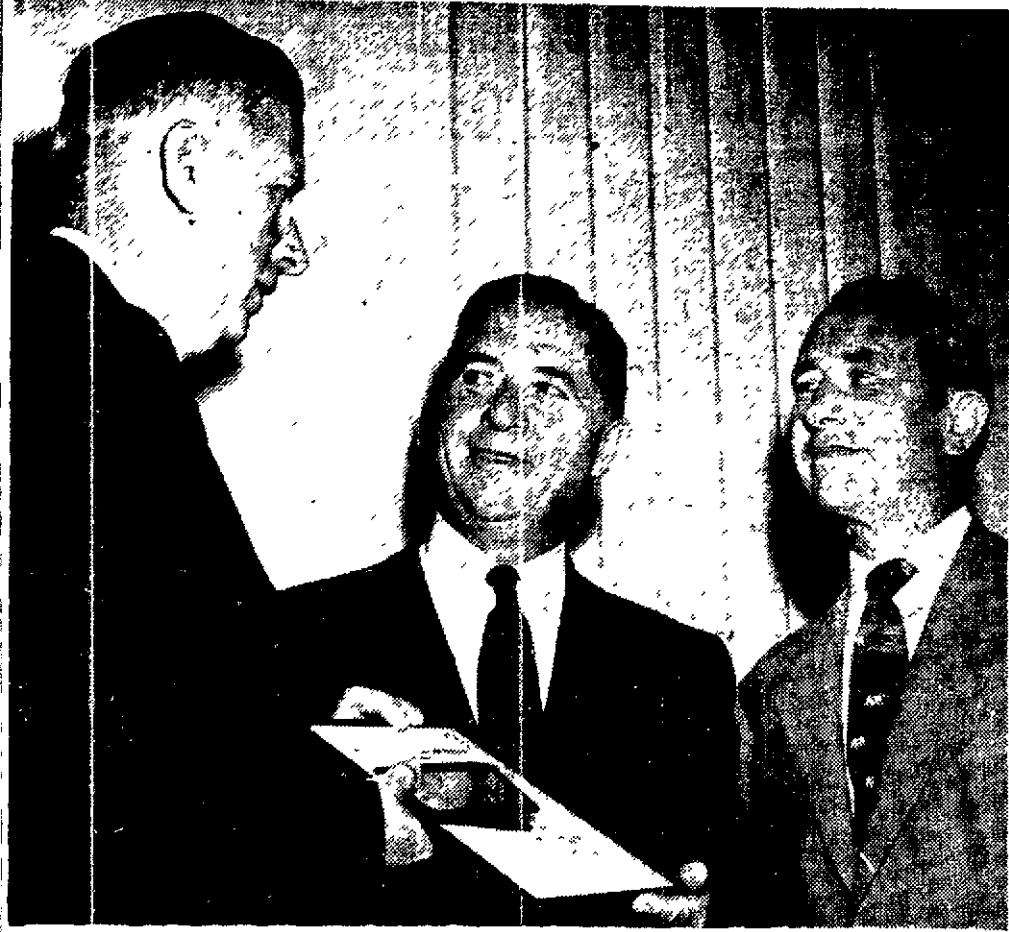
Dist. Atty. Frank Coakley today explained for Denver for a convention of the National Association of Prosecuting Attorneys after receiving honors from the group which he helped found.

Coakley, first president of the association at its founding three and a half years ago in New Orleans, was presented an inscribed gold membership card at a ceremony here.

In presenting the card and scroll President Miles McDonald, prosecuting attorney of Brooklyn, declared it was "the energy, integrity and ability" which has furthered the aims of association in improving criminal prosecution.

McDonald called Coakley "a D.A.'s D.A." S. P. Darden, New Orleans prosecutor and association vice-president, said the award was a tribute to a man "who has no fear, no favoritism and no discrimination" in his philosophy of prosecuting.

Congratulatory messages were received from Governor Warren, Senator Knowland, Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell Jr., his Deputy Warren Olney III, Walter Gordon of the Adult Authority, Chief Justice Phil S. Gibson and from the state and county bar and other groups.

## DR. ALVAREZ SAYS

### Dr. Kinsey's Findings Shouldn't Amaze You

Doubtless many persons will be angered at some of the things they will read in Dr. Kinsey's new book on the vagaries of women. They will say, "I don't believe," or, "I am not like that," or, "That is sinful," or, "Such things should not be talked about."

Even we doctors may find much of the book hard to accept because many of us are a bit prissy and prudish and unwilling to face honestly, and dispassionately some of the problems of sex. Few of us have ever read much about the subject, and many of us do not even want to hear anything about it.

#### UNHAPPY PERSONS

We doctors have usually refused to learn enough about the subject to help the poor, unhappy persons—men and women who were terribly gyped by some freak of nature. I remember a medical editor who once refused to let me even mention homosexuality in an article on serious neuroses. He said he was proud of the fact that he had never permitted the use of "that vile word" in his journal!

I can tell from their writings that even most of the psychiatrists, who certainly ought to know about 'homosexuality,' haven't read any of the books based on real studies of these people, and they have not read their very sad and moving autobiographies.

Actually, as Dr. Kinsey saw so clearly years ago, we physicians and psychiatrists, who are constantly being called upon to help people, puzzled and unhappy and all mixed up over sex, ought to know the facts about the subject. We may not like what we learn, but in science that is no matter; it should have nothing to do with the study. If a worker in science ever allows his emotions and his likes and dislikes of what is disgusting or sinful to influence his study—that day he ceases to be a scientist.

#### SOME ARE GYPED

You good people who soon will be reading the new volume, I won't blame you for being surprised or horrified or saddened or a bit frightened by what you learn, but I will very much blame you if you get angry at Dr. Kinsey and start impugning his motives or calling him names. You might just as well start reviling the great astronomers on Palomar Mountain for having seen with their new telescope a universe inconceivably larger than the one seen by the old prophets of Israel.

Years ago when I heard that a scientist was at last going to make a thorough study of sex in man I was so pleased that I did what I usually do under such circumstances: I made a pilgrimage to see him. In Bloomington, Ind., I found a fine, friendly, delightful and human person, who invited me to stay in his hospitable home over the weekend. I liked him from the mo-

ment I met him, and as I talked to him and learned how he got into this work, I came to respect him more and more; I felt grateful to him for having begun the exploration of a neglected field in science.

#### BEGAN WITH INSECTS

He told me how, after years of the study of insects, he had done some counseling of students, and had been distressed because he did not have the facts with which to answer the questions about sex that the young people asked him. He knew all about sex in lower forms of life, but in the books he could find very little on the habits of men and women. Finally, after talking to many scientists and finding that nowhere in this land was there a university center for the study of human sex life, he went to work to gather the information himself.

All of us in America should take our hats off to the man who had the sense of consecration and the courage to brave the strong taboos of society, and to go ahead and study all aspects of this forbidden subject, just as dispassionately as, for years, he had studied wasps and all their ways.

#### NO NAMES PLEASE

Disagree with Dr. Kinsey if you like, but never call him harsh names. All you can possibly say is that you wonder if the samples of men and women whom he studied are typical enough of the 160,000,000 of us in America. You may wonder if everyone whom he and his associates interviewed told the truth, but you should never question his reports of what they said.

After studying statistics for years, and after reading carefully Dr. Kinsey's first book, I am satisfied that the conclusions to which he arrives are close enough. What is true for the thousands he has interviewed must be fairly typical of people all over the country. He has made a great effort to get a good "sampling" of human-kind.

I would much appreciate it if persons would not write me during the last week in August and during September because I hope to take a little vacation. I would hate to return to find on my desk some 1500 letters. I would never get caught up again.

## California Flower Provides Clue to Evolution Process

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 25.—The production of new species by the addition of a chromosome has been suggested at various times, but Dr. Lewis' research has provided a practical demonstration.

A U.C.L.A. geneticist, Dr. Harlan Lewis, has found that the Clarkia occasionally adds a chromosome, setting the stage for a species change, by an irregular division of chromosomes in the reproduction of sex cells.

A Clarkia plant that normally has nine chromosomes may divide so that in one of the two new cells there occurs 10 chromosomes, and in the other, eight. The eight chromosome cells die off, but those with 10 may survive and give rise to functional sex cells.

Dr. Lewis says there may be no immediate outward change in the appearance of the plant, but with the addition of the chromosome, it has a greater capacity for mutations, so that in time it may become a completely different plant from its nine-chromosome parent species. In that way, a new species is born.
