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Vice Probe Here Pressed After Ex-Cop Is Held

Safe Driver Badge Won By San Leandro Corporal

Police intensified their investigation today into a vice ring that involves, among others, a 17-year-old girl and a former emergency patrolman on the Oakland force.

Already under arrest are three girls and three men picked up over the weekend by vice squad officers and agents from the district attorney's office.

Further arrests were expected as officials continued questioning those now in custody.

MET AT MOTEL

The arrests began early Saturday, when undercover officers picked up two girls who, according to Lt. Arthur McQuillan, accepted \$20 to go to a MacArthur Boulevard motel with the men.

Booked for investigation at the city jail were Patricia Ann Genero, 18, 547 24th St., and Carol Parker, 22, 4015 Burchhalter Ave.

Opal Alma Villalon, 17, of 13 1/2 45th Ave., a drive-in waitress, was being held at the Juvenile Detention Home for investigation of narcotics law violations.

Lieutenant McQuillan said the two older girls made arrangements to meet the undercover agents in front of the motel, and there accepted marked money and were arrested.

One of the two, Lieutenant McQuillan said, gave the officers information which led to the arrest of Miss Villalon.

A few hours later, members of the vice squad and a man from the district attorney's office picked up Miss Genero's brother, Robert Genero, 25, a musician, also of the 24th St. address.

He was arrested at a nightclub at 1457 1/2 East 14th St., San Leandro, where he is employed.

Genero was booked for investigation of pandering.

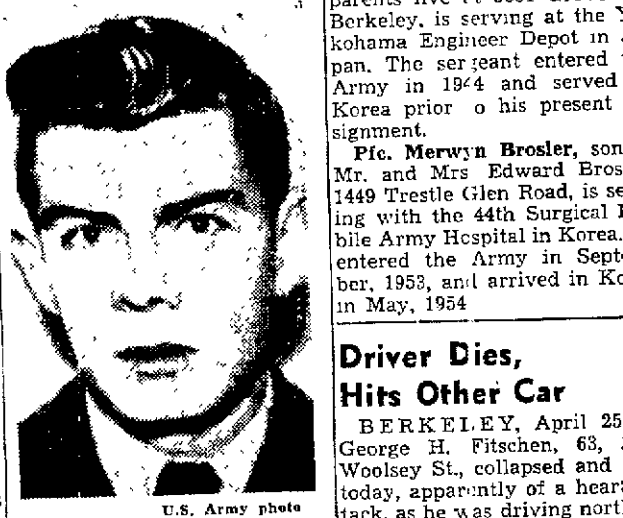

Municipal Judge Redmond C. Staats fined Begley \$15 and placed him on probation for three years with the provision that he maintain good conduct especially "in all public meetings," he attends.

The judge said the probation would be revoked if the former firefighter did not comply with all rules of any meeting he attends.

Begley, 66, of 1401 Grant St., was arrested on a complaint signed by former mayor Laurence L. Cross which alleged that the former fireman used "loud and abusive language" when he appeared at a council meeting April 5. Begley was found guilty of disturbing the peace by a jury last Wednesday. He said he would appeal the case.
