Dr. Stowell, Noted Law Educator, Dies

BERKELEY, Jan. 2.—Dr. Elery Cory Stowell, 82, distinguished retired professor of international law, died yesterday at his home, 970 Santa Rosa Ave., after a long illness.

Dr. Stowell had come West to retire in 1940 after nearly 20 years as professor at the American University in Washington, D.C. He previously had taught at Columbia University and the University of Pennsylvania.

A graduate of Harvard University with the class of 1898 he received his doctorate in Paris in 1906.

PIONEER IN FIELD
He was regarded as a pioneer American student in his field and was devoted to the establishment of individual rights under international law.

He served at the U.S. Secretariat at The Hague peace conference in 1907, the London naval conference in 1909 and was active in citizens' groups in both World Wars.

He was credited with initiating the Hall of Nations plan of bringing foreign students to Washington for study as a means of promoting international understanding.

Dr. Stowell was author of a number of books including "Principles of International Law."

PHI BETA KAPPA
He was an honorary Phi Beta Kappa and a member of the American Society of International Law and the American Political Science Association.

He was a member of the Cosmos Club in Washington, D.C. for 50 years.

He is survived by his wife, Cecile R. Stowell, and three children, Ellery C. Stowell Jr., assistant professor of biochemistry at USC; Mrs. Anne S. Freedman of Los Angeles, and Mrs. Isabel Pitt Mavity of Berkeley. There are two grandchildren.

Memorial services will be conducted at the home of Dr. Dean Josiah Bartlett of the Starr King School for the Ministry.

Final Rites for Major Loosley

BERKELEY, Jan. 2.—Funeral services were to be held here today for Maj. Milan Adrian Loosley, USA, ret., a veteran of the Philippine campaign against Aguinaldo and a member of a pioneer Oregon family who died Thursday at Letterman Army Hospital after a brief illness.

Major Loosley organized and commanded a signal battalion which served in France during World War I. He was responsible for the creation of the first telephone wires in the Territory of Alaska during his Army career, which covered the years from the turn of the century to 1915.

A graduate of Klamath College, Ore., the major was a member of a pioneer family. He was born in 1870 in Oregon and served in the U.S. Army for 25 years.

Mr. Loosley was a member of the Holy Names Society of Our Lady of Lourdes Church and of the Oakland Council of the Knights of Columbus.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. at the John J. Cox Funeral Memorial Chapel, 416 Howe St. Interment will take place at Holy Sepulcher Cemetery.

DRAFT AIDE QUILTS IN ROW OVER ELVIS

HARLAN, Ky., Jan. 2.—A draft board official in this southeastern Kentucky coal mining town resigned today because he wants mountain boys to get the same treatment accorded rock 'n' roll star Elvis Presley.

State Rep. H. Nick Johnson, a wounded veteran of World War II, said a recent induction deferment granted the Memphis, Tenn., teenage idol "made it impossible for me to serve as a member of local board 33."

Johnson said if the deferment given Presley, so he could produce another movie, "is a criterion then the Sputnik and Mullin act isn't as serious as represented."

"I cannot conscientiously ask any mountain boy to serve the same country unless afforded the same treatment as Presley," Johnson said in his resignation letter.

2nd Safest Year in Air Transportation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—The year 1957 was the second safest in the history of air transportation, with 100,000 passengers killed, the 1957 record compared to the 5.5 fatality rate of 1946.

Pacific Heights Home Burglarized

Another home in San Francisco's exclusive Pacific Heights has been burglarized, this time by thieves preoccupied with liquor and drugs.

Mrs. Aileen Whitaker of 3653 Jackson St., told police she returned home yesterday to find some \$540 in liquor and 24 cocaine tablets had been taken. Also missing were two watches valued at \$100 each.

The burglars forced entry through a pantry door and then used a hatchet to break open Mrs. Whitaker's liquor locker. They took six cases of Scotch whisky, one case of champagne, a case of vermouth and a case of gin.
